





### Where did we begin?

In 2007 the Government of Canada selected Adaptive Phased Management (APM) as Canada's plan for the long-term management of all of Canada's high level used nuclear fuel. The APM Project calls for the centralized containment and isolation of Canada's used fuel in a deep geological repository (DGR). In 2010 Ignace, along with 21 other communities across Canada, put forth an expression of interest in becoming a host community for the DGR.

#### Examples of skills required for the APM Project

Geoscience, drilling, engineering, equipment operation, technical support, environmental assessment, safety assessment, monitoring, engagement, social science, scientists, mining, construction, trades, regulatory affairs, administration, and communications.

## Where are we now?

Ignace and South Bruce Ontario are the two communities who are left continuing the Site Selection Process today. These two communities remain committed to learning more about the APM Project as we focus on the Willingness stage of the Site Selection Process. A site will be determined in 2023, and the host community will undergo a broad range of studies as the Licensing Process begins.

## Recycling TIPS

### Reduce the number of single-use plastic bags you use!

- Say "no" when a retailer offers you a bag (plastic or paper). For a few items, we usually don't need a bag.
- Bring a reusable bag when you go shopping.
- Reuse your single-use bags around your home – use bags for packing material, trash can liners, and to pick up animal waste.
- If you do use plastic bags, return them to a retailer that accepts them for recycling.
- Pack your bags as full as possible. Remember that a plastic bag can hold up to 17 pounds of product – nearly 2000 times its own weight.
- Paper isn't always the better choice. Paper bags take more natural resources to make than plastic bags do.

**Remember, reduce your use of plastic bags, and reuse and recycle the ones already in your home.**




### Oh, What Fun!





### DID YOU KNOW?

**RADIATION IS EVERYWHERE.** It includes harmless visible light and radio waves, but also energy carried by particles of atoms moving through space.

STRICT LAWS AND RULES FOR THE NUCLEAR INDUSTRY, AND AN INDEPENDENT NUCLEAR REGULATOR **KEEP CANADIANS SAFE.**



### USES OF RADIATION

**NUCLEAR POWER:** Works by inducing radiation to be released from Uranium in a process called fission. This produces heat, which boils water and spins a turbine to make power. IT'S THAT SIMPLE.

**NUCLEAR MEDICINE:** Both diagnoses and treats illnesses like cancer using radiation. Nuclear imaging helps locate diseases within the body, and focused high-dose treatments help destroy them.

**NUCLEAR SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY:** IS A MAJOR PART OF CANADIAN INDUSTRY. Neutron imaging quality in aircraft components, and gamma irradiation keeps consumer products like food and cosmetics sterile.

### RADIATION:


**RADIATION** is the excess energy emitted by an unstable atom as it becomes stable. **EVERYONE OF US ARE EXPOSED TO RADIATION EVERY DAY.**

A **SIEVERT (SV)**, named after a Swedish physicist, is the unit used to measure radiation.

Eating a banana is equal to 0.1 microsieverts.

Dental X-rays are equal to 5 microsieverts.

A cranial scan is 2000 microsieverts.




### IT'S ENERGY

**Radiation** is simply transmitted energy. It travels as waves or particles, and it is found everywhere in the universe, coming from rocks, the sun, and the stars.

You can sense some types of radiation, such as light and heat, other types, such as radio waves and ultraviolet, require special instruments to detect.

When radiation is powerful enough to knock electrons from atoms, it is called ionizing radiation. It can damage materials and living tissue, it comes from natural and artificial sources, **and is the type of radiation that nuclear industries and regulators measure and protect against.**



### TYPES OF IONIZING RADIATION


IONIZING RADIATION COMES FROM VARIOUS SOURCES AND IN VARIOUS FORMS, SUCH AS:

**ALPHA PARTICLES** – Large, slow-moving particles that cannot penetrate your skin.

**BETA PARTICLES** – Fast-moving electrons or positrons that can only penetrate a few millimetres into tissue.

**GAMMA RAYS AND Z-RAYS** – Energy packets called photons which move at the speed of light and are stopped by dense materials like lead.

**NEUTRONS** – High-energy subatomic particles that are stopped best by hydrogen-rich materials like water or concrete.

### Recent Collisions in the Ignace area.

Recent collisions in Northwestern Ontario have been a hot topic of conversation; whether about the condition of the roads, the training the truck drivers receive or simply the weather conditions in general. What is the answer to lessening the collisions on our highways? Is it twinning the Highways? Is it adding centre passing lanes in an attempt to curb the deaths and serious injuries on our roads? That is what is going to happen between in the North Bay area where 2 – 15 km stretches will have passing lanes added. Sweden has implemented this strategy and their fatality rate have been reduced from 55 – 80 percent along with improving travel times. It promotes inappropriate passing and prevents other driver related errors.



This rink was located behind War Memorial School (junior and senior grades), the site of today's Plaza. The schoolhouse at right hosted the primary grades. The white house centre rear was located where PetroCan/Wayfare is today. Skater is unidentified.

## A history of Ignace's outdoor skating rinks

Skaters used to Ignace's indoor recreation facility, which opened in 1976, with artificial ice and an ice-resurfacer (aka Zamboni), can little understand what skaters experienced before then. Outdoor rinks were flooded when it got cold enough, sometimes by paid staff, but frequently by volunteers. Similarly handled was maintenance and snow removal, the latter not always easy as evidenced by the photo at left which shows how high one had to throw the snow with a shovel. Often removing snow was turned into fun by pushing, while on skates, a scoop, creating snow-free paths wending throughout the snow-covered rink then skating along them. Numb toes and fingers were warmed by holding them close to wood-fired stoves in the skating shack next to the rink. Once experienced, one can never forget the odour of wet wool socks and mitts steaming near the stove!

Ignace-raised historian and author Elinor Barr writes about the upper left picture, "It seems to me that the town had to get permission from the CPR to use water from the standpipe to flood that first rink. Mr. Colley, a CPR employee, was reeve at the time and I remember one year that flood-

ing was delayed awaiting said permission. Also, there was always an adult man tending the fires in the rink shack. He also tried to prevent fights and to see that big kids took care of the younger ones. For example, tying their skates, etc.

"I also recall that we skated on the pond (across the railway tracks) for a few years in the 1950's, at least until there was too much snow to shovel to clear skating space. Another problem was that pond weeds froze into the ice, causing people to stumble and fall."

 Ignace-raised author Betty Dyck sent her thoughts...

"I remember the outside lights and the sound of skates on the ice, and the thud of the puck against the wooden fence, and the fun of soaring around on the ice.

"The first skating rink I remember using was at the end of Front Street, which ran behind the CPR houses. It had a "warming shack" with a wood-fired stove, benches to sit on and windows that looked out on the rink. I can remember going there after snow storms and helping to clear the ice -- along with other kids. Bill Wells was the "custodian" some of the time. He often tied my skates for me -- this would have been in the 1930's.

Then the rink was moved to behind the War Memorial School.

"I even played some very rudimentary hockey with boys and girls. During one game a "slap shot" puck hit me just below the eye -- ouch! Black and blue for awhile. Kids were always willing to clear the ice, and I believe we had to bring our own shovels.

"I also remember the huge snowbanks around the boards where people sat/stood to watch adult hockey games. I remembered that (my brother) Bob and I also skated on the pond. Sometimes we put our skates on at home and "hobbled"

across the tracks. It was very cold on the fingers to put the skates on at the pond, but I seem to recall that we did, and also that we sometimes lit a fire over there."

\*\*\*

Ninety-year-old Dot DeFeo remembers the earliest rink and says that was in her teen years and early dating in her life in the winter months started with conversations as follows, "Are you going skating?" and you would meet up there. She remembers Matt Wren being one of the custodians. She also remembers skating on the pond by the railway tracks as well as on the creek near today's Post Office.
